

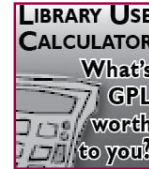

The 2009/2010 Annual Budget Message From the Board of Trustees and the Director of the Guilderland Public Library

During the 2008/2009 budget year, the Library brought a wealth of programming and services to the community with the support of your tax dollars. Some statistical highlights that illustrate this are:

- Summer Reading Club participation jumped by 51%
- Circulation increased by 6% in the first 8 months of this year
- And, for the first time, the library stayed open for a full day on summer Saturdays, increasing our open hours to 3,400 annually.

We have, for the last ten years, been very successful in increasing our service programs by taking maximum advantage of grant-funded opportunities, increasing programming with no additional expense to the community. We have also benefited financially from the support of our all-volunteer Friends of the Guilderland Library and the Guilderland Library Foundation. To a lesser degree, financial support from the State also reduced the cost to Guilderland residents.

We hope to continue receiving this support in the coming year, however, as every New Yorker knows, our economic challenges have increased. With these challenges in mind, we are proposing a maintenance level budget, one that is below the pace of inflation, but maintains the services and programs that we offer to the community. The stresses we are all facing as the result of the larger economic problems occurring throughout the country are reflected in the outside sources of revenue the Library receives. As of this writing, the Governor has proposed cutting library funding by 10%-18% for 2009/2010. This means the State contribution to our library is estimated to drop to \$8,500.

As taxpayers, you should be aware of the economic challenges we are facing. New York State has pushed two unfunded mandates on public libraries this year, both of which have stretched resources and staff:

1. Paper tax forms for the state were eliminated and taxpayers directed to the public library for the forms, an anticipated cost to our library of \$10,000 and
2. Unemployment offices have been so overwhelmed by new claims that they have been instructing people to use public library computers to fill out the claim forms prior to coming to the claims office. This has stretched our computer resources as well as our ability to help patrons navigate the maze of the unemployment bureaucracy.

Furthermore, our anticipated interest income (from budgeted operating funds banked until needed) will be far less than in years past. Banks are paying less than

2% interest on short and long-term investments, which we anticipate will translate to at least a \$10,000 loss to the Library.

We are instituting measures that will bring our fee structure in line with other leading libraries in the area:

- We are establishing an annual \$25 fee for our non-library district resident patrons. We are the last of the local public libraries to do so. What this means is, as of July 1, 2009, if you do not live within the Guilderland Public Library District (the same boundaries as the Guilderland Central School District) you must pay a \$25 annual fee for your Guilderland library card. Currently, Town of Guilderland residents who live outside the Library district are not taxed for the Library services they receive.
- For the first time in more than a decade, we are increasing our overdue fees. Beginning July 1, overdue fees for all materials borrowed from the library – whether books, audio or video – will be assessed at a uniform 20 cents per day.
- We are establishing a \$1 fee for computer guest passes; this goes into effect on July 1.

These were hard choices to make, but necessary in today's economic reality.

We know the value of the Library's service to the community, and have submitted a budget that maintains services at the current year's level. You'll note that in order to do this we have held or lowered funding in six out of the ten budgetary areas. We have added a "value calculator" to our website that allows you to compute the value you have received from the library this past year. Try it out, you will be surprised at the savings you get by using your library!

If you have comments about the budget, we will be pleased to hear them at the Public Hearing on the Final Approved Budget on May 14, at 7 pm, in the Library's Normanskill Room.

In addition, Mrs. Fraterrigo has been a member of the Guilderland School Board since 1997. She is currently on that Board's Policy and Communications Committees.

Brian Wheeler

Brian Wheeler is running for an open seat on the Library's Board. Mr. Wheeler, his wife Liza, and their son Thomas have lived in Guilderland for more than a year. He is a member of Grace Baptist Church on State Farm Road.

Mr. Wheeler works in the Internet Technologies department of the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance.



Mr. Wheeler's statement: "I would like the opportunity to help shape our Library for the future. It's my goal to ensure that we provide resources and programs that will attract our children, and provide a safe educational venue that fosters their development."

**Jennifer Lemak, PhD, Senior Historian and
Curator of African-American History at the
New York State Museum**

Did you know the Rapp Road neighborhood is on the National Register of Historic Places? It's also a designated New York State Historic District. And it's in our own backyard!

Dr. Lemak's most recent work, *Southern Life, Northern City: The History of Albany's Rapp Road Community* (SUNY Press, 2008) traces the history of a little known African-American community located in Albany's Pine Bush. Most of its original residents migrated from Shubuta, Mississippi, to Albany in the 1930s and 1940s under the direction of a preacher named Louis W. Parsons. This presentation will chronicle the history of the migrants from Mississippi to Albany, challenges in preserving the Rapp Road Community's history, and discuss tools for community-based research projects. R

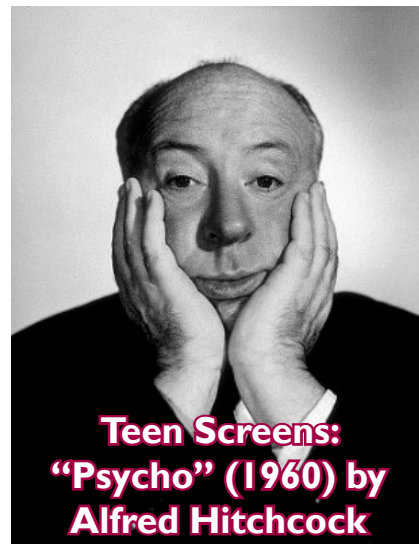
